COMMENTARY

Week 18

Begins with a key win for Sparta in the battle to avoid relegation. They beat fellow strugglers Insurance 8-2 and thereby eased their relegation worries a bit. This was a good team effort from Sparta, spearheaded by Dave Evans who won all three, dropping one end all night. That's Dave's third maximum in Sparta's last four games. He was backed up by two each from Tokely and Hattrill. For Insurance, it was a disappointing and inconsistent night. The usually dependable Ian Cranstone lost all three while Albert Frances beat Tokely and Jon Velinor beat Hattrill. Closest sets of the night were Tokely's defeat of Cranstone 11-7 in the fifth and Velinor's win over Hattrill 11-8 in the fifth. After last week's shock defeat, Nat West return to winning form with a runaway 10-0 victory over Outcasts. Six of the singles sets ended three straight. Chris Herbert looked a class above with three three-straight wins. We haven't seem much of Les Samuels this season but he marked his return to the team with a maximum, though he was pushed very hard by Andrew Macalister and had to concentrate in the fifth end which he won 11-3. Gareth Jones was Nat West's third player and he too completed a hat trick, which included a narrow three straight defeat of Macalister by scores of 13-11, 12-10, 12-10! Morpeth made light work of Treasury B winning 9-1. Bekele was untroubled and ran off nine straight ends for the perfect maximum. Duncan Brown had a more challenging night, beating David Shore in a long set that he could have easily lost in three but then coming back to take the fourth and fifth ends with ease. It was a similar pattern against John Colgan with Duncan starting slow but then accelerating away to win in four. He duly completed his maximum with a threestraight win over Okai. Terese Johansson had a great night beating John Colgan 11-9 in the fifth after 102 points and David Shore 11-6 in the fifth. Just as I was casting my vote for Terese as Player of the Match something odd happened and she found herself on the wrong end of a three-straight win by Jeremy Okai. Well done Jeremy! That's one of those results that makes you scratch your head in puzzlement. The night ended on a high spot with a seesaw doubles where Morpeth went two ends to one up, lost the fourth 11-8 and finally won the fifth 12-10. Couldn't have been closer. The doubles can sometimes be a bit of a non-event but we've had some really good doubles sets this season. Four five-enders in that match and Morpeth won all of them! Treasury A were looking for a whitewash against Employment but the match was by no means one sided. A big upset looked on the cards in the first set as Paul Baylis was two ends to one up on Winston Wong and in with a good chance of taking the set in the fourth. Winston won that end 11-8 and, in the fifth, Paul's chance suddenly evaporated as Winston took the final end 11-4. Fung versus Richard Oppenheim was also a tight contest but Perry just won out in the fourth

at 14-12. If Richard had taken that end I'm sure the final end would have been a real scrap. It was clearly going to be a "so near yet so far" night for Richard as he fought his was back from two ends down to Wong, levelled the set, only to get blown away 11-5 in the fifth. Yet there was consolation ahead. Richard took the first two ends against Laikram Persaud but heartbreakingly lost the next two ends to find himself playing another five-ender. This time things went Richard's way and he won the set 11-8. I think that's a great win as Laikram never gives anything away and is one of the hardest players to beat in this Division. A 9-1 result in favour of Treasury A but six of the ten sets went past the third end as Employment fought hard. The final match of the week and Castaways are hoping to catch up on Treasury A. That was always going to be difficult with Steve Fagan in the opposition but Castaways started brilliantly, running off the first five sets which included a surprising three-straight win for Keld Jaksland over Fagan! Steve then took his revenge out on Neil LeMilliere in set six, winning comfortably. The rest of the sets were uneventful and all went Castaways' way for a 9-1 victory. Special mention for Keld Jaksland who won all three, which seemed highly unlikely given his lack-lustre performance in last week's match. Looking at the scorecard, it's clear Treasury A were challenged far harder by Employment than Castaways were challenged by Comets.

So week 18's results leave the gap at the top unchanged. The relegation battle takes another twist as Sparta move up leaving Insurance far from safe. One-third of the season left with Comets and Outcasts under the greatest pressure to secure points. I suspect the relegation position is going to alter every week

In next week's fixtures, Sparta have a tough match against Nat West while Outcasts are likely to take sets off Employment (again, all will turn on team selection). Insurance will be looking for a big win against Treasury B. . If history is anything to go by PRO will cause Castaways no trouble but, witness the first half result, it's by no means a foregone conclusion. Treasury A will need to be on top form not to lose sets against Comets but if, as rumoured Steve Fagan is not playing for Comets, 10-0 looks the likely outcome.
