COMMENTARY

Week 21

Three matches postponed this week so only two results two review and both involve relegation. First, Treasury B take on Comets. A big factor emerges early on as it becomes clear that Comets only have two players. However, Comets have Steve Fagan and, true to form, he rattled off three wins in double quick time, dropping a single end, to Brian Gittens. Greg Gargrupe's sets were almost in direct contrast as each proved to be a mighty battle. Greg leads Jeremy Okai by two ends to one but Jeremy comes back to take the fourth end narrowly at 11-9. Into the final end things start to swing Jeremy's way as he edges in front and stays there to win the end 11-7. There was a strange sense of deja vu in Greg's set with Brian Gittens. Greg took the first two ends and lost the third. He might have pinched the win in the fourth but came up short, losing 11-9. The fifth end was close but again Greg just lost out by 11-8. Two sets in which Greg led two ends to one, lost the fourth 11-9 in both cases and went on to lose the fifth. Strange coincidence! Greg's set against David Shore provided a bit of variety as this time Greg was two ends to one down. However he storms back to take the fourth and into the final end. This end went on and on and could have gone either way but, as if to confirm this just wasn't to be Greg's night, he lost the final end 16-14! To sum up, Greg played 15 ends and 282 point over the evening but lost all three (the record for most point played in a night is held by Steve Fagan in the 2015-16 season – 291 points). Table tennis can be cruel! Comets won the doubles with ease but the victory went to Treasury B by 6-4. Their first match won in the season. Congratulations! The other match played – Insurance versus Nat West - was equally interesting and almost as dramatic. It began in the same was as the previous match – this time it was Nat West with two players: Gareth Jones and Mike Hughes. Gareth Jones opened with a good win over Albert Francis over four ends. He had a real battle with Ian Cranstone and found himself two ends to one down. He rallied to take the fourth end 11-7. The fifth end could not have been closer but it was Gareth who edged it 12-10! More déjà vu in Ian's set with Mike Hughes as once again he found himself two ends to one up only to lose the fourth end comfortably. The fifth end was again for strong men only, going on past 10-10, 11-11, 12-12, and 13-13 before Ian inched ahead to win the set 15-13. Close call! The tight sets didn't end there as Francis went up against Hughes. Mike wins two of the first three ends but Albert takes the fourth end 11-9. It was point for point in the final end but Albert snuck home by 11-9! Insurance' Jon Velinor had a frustrating night and just couldn't get anything going to lose both his sets. So, three sets claimed plus one win each from Albert and Ian gives Insurance a 5-4 lead into the doubles. The moral of this week's results is don't go two ends to one up and then lose the fourth because heartbreak awaits you

in the fifth end. And so it was to be in the doubles as Insurance are two ends to one up, lose the fourth 11-9, and then lose the fifth end by the same score. So an honourable draw results but I'm sure I heard Insurance players muttering "unluckiest team in the league" as they made their way home!

Only two matches this week, low on quantity but high on quality with two really good contests. Insurance have bolstered their prospects of staying up and are level on points with Comets. As I said in the last bulletin, Outcasts have it all to do if they are to avoid going down with Treasury B. Next week's fixtures look bleak for the relegation candidates with Insurance probably having the "easiest" match of those being played by the bottom five teams.
